Indigenous Recognition Statement

One of the four Values of St. Michaels University School is respect. With this in mind, we acknowledge that our school rests in the heart of Straits Salish territory, a living culture with its own rites, ceremonies, and unfolding history. We honour the Esquimalt, Songhees, and WSÁNEĆ peoples – whose homelands we share and whom we recognize as our neighbours.





As I write, it feels as if our beautiful Richmond Road campus has gently exhaled. After a frenetic last few weeks of the 2021-22 academic year, the echoes from the graduation gala and a whole host of farewell ceremonies, have gradually settled into silence. At the same time, our memories of the graduating Class of 2022 will gradually become less vivid as they move onto face challenges over broader horizons around the world. For all of us who work at the centre of school communities, each year is memorable. The 2021-22 school year will linger longer in the memory than most. It may even, with the qualification of time, be seen as an exceptional year.

At graduation in June I talked of the strange alchemy that happens when inspiring teaching, enthusiastic learners and breadth of opportunity come together. That alchemy has created magical outcomes for many of our 158 graduating students, whose biographies confirmed that they had made the very most of their time at SMUS. This graduating class has had more to contend with than most. I know that everyone joins me in wishing them bon voyage and God speed.

At graduation I also referred to the need for constancy in a world of fast change. I quoted Simon Armitage, poet laureate from the UK, who wrote a poem celebrating the Platinum Jubilee for Queen Elizabeth II. In the poem he writes:

It is constancy, and it is change: the age of clockwork morphs to digital days, but the song of the black bird remains the same.

This quote very beautifully makes the point that despite revolutionary change in many areas, values and foundations remain vital in giving a sense of constancy and direction.

The 2021-22 academic year will be remembered as a time of reawakening. One commentator put it, "the SMUS giant, tied and constrained by COVID restrictions, tore off various chains restricting freedom and started to move again."



We were delighted that the COVID bounce-back was reflected in strong admissions. The largest ever school enrolment in September 2021 and a full complement of boarders meant that we began the year in fine fettle. Reflecting back on this year of all years, we must also pay tribute to Angie Hay and the staff in our Health Centre who valiantly led from the front all year, ensuring that our boarders have remained safe.

The year will also be remembered as our Jubilee. Much planning and preparation had gone into organizing a series of celebrations to commemorate the great merger 50 years on from 1971, when St. Michael's School and University School formally came together. A mass open air assembly in September provided a focal point for our extended community to look back and reflect on 50 years of extraordinary growth. During that period, the school has more than quadrupled in size, its facilities have been transformed by a number of philanthropists, and the school's reputation for academic achievement and broad range of holistic experiences has spread across Canada, and dare I say it, even around the world. Jubilee was an opportunity to pay tribute to all those faculty, staff, and students, who in many cases devoted the majority of their lives to ensuring that St. Michaels University School was on the road to progress. We acknowledged early in Jubilee that whilst it was important to look back, reflect, and celebrate, Jubilee was also an opportunity to remind ourselves of our responsibility as the current generation to maintain the rate of progress to the benefit of those to come in the future.

In this context against the background of sensitive and thorough work by our Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion Advisory Group, under the leadership of Becky Anderson and EDI Guide Dr. Moussa Magassa, we were also able to make an intentional step forward in our desire to recognize the heritage of our local Indigenous neighbours. At another mass assembly, we welcomed Elders and representatives from local Indigenous communities to dedicate our Values, intricately carved using First Nations symbolism in the form of four beautiful Spindle Whorls, representing our Values: courage, honesty, respect and service.



The Spindle Whorls project has been completed by Dylan Thomas, who, as our school's Indigenous Scholar for the 2021-22 school year (and again for the 2022-23 school year) devoted much time to sharing his story and engaging many of our students in a project to carve a new Welcome Post.

The year will also be remembered for the outstanding academic achievement of the Class of 2022. Our University Counseling Department, under the new leadership of Ruth McGhee, published its Crescat development plan to set a fresh course and a heightened level of ambition for the onward journeys of our departing students. We saw incredibly strong academic results on our Senior School AP exams. We can also confirm that \$3.6 million in scholarships was offered to our students from top universities including Cambridge, Cornell, and others around the world.

There were a number of other milestones this past year:

- Welcoming new leaders to key appointments
 - Shara Campsall was appointed to take over from Adrienne Davidson as Director of Advancement. Shara and Adrienne Davidson have worked closely over the last few years which has enabled the smoothest possible handover, at a time when the momentum building behind our Journey for Life campaign is starting to accelerate.
 - We also welcomed Chetan Sondagar as our first ever Chief Information Officer, to advise on a strategic direction regarding information technology.
 - Cheryl Major arrived to take over from Stuart Hill as Director of Marketing and Communications. Cheryl has already launched a broad audit of SMUS communications, which will work its way through into a Communications Master Plan.

- This last year has also seen the launch of the first of several projects contained within the SMUS Campus Master Plan. The Junior School Annex project was approved by the Board and has moved from theoretical plans into an actual building site. This \$10-million extension and refurbishment is destined for completion by the start of the 2023 academic year. Plans have also begun for a similarly ambitious project to transform and update the Middle School.
 - To fund this investment in our aim to give our students and faculty the best possible learning and teaching environment, we have launched the Journey for Life Campaign. At time of publication, \$5 million of the \$10 million required for the Junior School Annex project has been raised. For a successful conclusion to this project, we will need our key influencers to demonstrate philanthropic leadership at this pivotal moment in SMUS's onward progress.
- The year has also been notable for a particularly rich seam of extracurricular achievements. Again, the Senior School musical earned rave reviews for its medley of musical highlights, as did the Grade 5 musical and the Grade 8 film. Our sports teams have excelled themselves with both the breadth of success and a number of notable national achievements. Rowing, track and field, squash, and field hockey stand out for provincial- or national-level accolades.
- Once again, this year we are most grateful to Elisa Djurickovic, President of the Parents' Auxiliary, for the extraordinary job that she and her team do in harnessing volunteer enthusiasm into practical support and appreciation for the school.
- I would also like to thank Samantha Stone '87, retiring President of SMUSAA, for the excellent work she has done in galvanizing the 8,000 members of our alumni diaspora. I look forward to working with Neil Mulholland '88, the new president, as he takes over the reigns.

Thank you for your contributions and commitment to our school community, which made the 2021-22 school year a success.

Message from the Chair of the Board of Governors

It is a privilege and honour to report to you as the Chair of the Board of Governors for the SMUS Society for 2021-22.

The 2021-22 school year was a busy one for us on the Board, as we've moved from a COVID-dominated agenda to one that's had the luxury of being able to look further out into the future and allow us, as Governors, to focus less on more immediate concerns that COVID produced, and more on what we can do to ensure that our school is ready for the next decades.

Foremost amongst this is our desire to continue the work to execute upon Floreat, our strategic plan.

To do this, we've laid out a plan for the next four years of Board focus, understanding that while there will always be issues that pop up, requiring our attention, there are a core group of issues, particularly around Floreat, that must be planned for, and planned now. Foremost amongst these are the extensive capital projects before us – the Junior School Annex, the Middle School, a Science Centre STEAM Expansion, and a Heritage Centre – that will allow our school to remain competitive and relevant in the coming decades.

To that end, this year, we've prioritized the order of work; after we've completed the Junior School Annex and refurbishment in the coming year, we will begin work on the Middle School; the Science Centre STEAM Expansion will follow that, and we will finish with the Heritage Centre.

We have established a rhythm of discussion and decision making to allow us to move forward on these projects, one by one; in each case, we start with the requirements of the facility, guided by our experts in the faculty, and then move on to budgets and a plan for funding them. Every member of the Board is involved, not just through our actual Board meetings, but through the considerable background work to prepare for these decisions: the Facilities and Technology, Finance, Advancement, Sustainability, and Governance committees are all directly involved

with the work required to get these projects ready. We have learned from mistakes we have made in the past, and we have incorporated these lessons into our modus operandi going forward; the end result is a predictable, planned approach to the gradual but definitive Board backing of each proposal, once that proposal is deemed fit-for-purpose and ready for approval.

While this focus on organizing our approach to these big projects is a core part of my work-statement and satisfaction as Chair, it is the constant reminders that I work for a school (my favourite one) that really make all the work worthwhile. I was lucky enough to hand out graduation certificates to half of the graduating class in June, and it reminded me of the last time I stood on the same stage myself (33 years before!) and the pride and excitement I felt then. It is easy, sometimes, in the rush and anxiety of preparing business plans, proposals, votes and the rest of the important business of a Board like this, to forget what SMUS actually does: it launches young adults forward into "real life." I remember how exciting and frightening that was for me, and looking into the eyes of each graduate and handing them that simple piece of paper that summarized years of hard work, reminded me of how important our school is to its graduates and their families.

We're so lucky to be here and to have a plan that will ensure we continue to be here for generations to come. Thank you for another excellent year, for everything you do to support the school.

Admissions

This past September, SMUS opened with the second largest school size in history, welcoming 1,023 students – evidence of the great work done in the 2021-22 school year. A reduction in enrolment from the previous year was quite deliberate, and in line with the school's strategic aim and commitment to remain a school of around 1,000 students. We welcomed 809 returning students and 214 who are new to SMUS.

The 2021-22 year was a time of significant renewal and forward movement in Admissions. While the most visible evidence of work is reaching enrolment and program targets, there is a great deal that takes place behind the scenes. Departmental strategies coupled with strong local demand for our day program certainly contributed to a significant increase in applications, but also disappointment for students and families who were unable to secure a space at SMUS. The boarding community opened with a solid, near-full complement of 255 boarders from 28 countries, similar to pre-pandemic years. At a time of continued uncertainties, the confidence families place in SMUS is evident as they continue to make independent schooling a priority, enabling their child to continue benefitting from a SMUS education. Retention continues to be exceptionally high at SMUS.

Building and maintaining diversity at SMUS is an important priority. The school's various tuition assistance programs support about 20% of this year's student community. The most recent addition is the Indigenous Peoples Within Canada Award. All families, at every grade and program, are eligible to apply for financial aid.

This year, Admissions took a significant step forward in implementing a key strategic priority as laid out in the 2021-2024 Enrolment Management Plan. A new enrolment system replaced a system that had been in place for over a dozen years. Early feedback from prospective parents and guardians is highly positive. Moving through the 21st century, at a time when technology plays a vital role in how we operate, using technology to its fullest capacity is an absolute requirement. It is near impossible to imagine paper admissions applications, yet that is how admissions managed some 15 years ago. The new system also allows Admissions to support another key priority for the school in its work towards equity, diversity and inclusion with an application that is more inclusive. Although the year saw recruitment practices mostly mirror those during the pandemic, the many in-person welcome events were well received and highly enjoyed by our day and boarding families.

While the key entry years for SMUS continue to be Kindergarten and Grades 6 and 9, in September 2023 SMUS will welcome the school's youngest learners into a new Junior Kindergarten program for children ages 3 and 4. This exciting addition to school programming is already generating a lot of interest.

An overarching goal for Admissions is to continue to see an increase in admissions applications. The power of referrals has served the school exceptionally well. Current families, alumni, students, staff, and friends of SMUS play a significant role in admissions. As Admissions turns to the 2023-24 school year, it will be a time of reconnecting and in-person recruitment events locally, nationally and internationally. Admissions is grateful for the many introductions from our current families, present and past staff, and alumni around the world.

Academic Achievements

The following lists provides a summary of various highlights across our academic program in relation to strategic priorities and student success for 2021-22.

Academic Highlights

- We focused on building literacy and numeracy skills in our Junior and Middle School programs and ensuring our students were well prepared for the Grade 10 and Grade 12 Graduation Literacy and Numeracy Assessments. Our students earned strong results in the Grade 4 and 7 Foundation Skills Assessments with most students achieving 3s or 4s on these assessments.
- Our curriculum continued to be enhanced with connections to Indigenous Ways of Knowing through the support and guidance of our Indigenous Scholar, Dylan Thomas, and our Elder guide, Bill White. We continue to find ways to engage in professional learning and community discussions so that we are intentional and thoughtful in these connections. We had a group of approximately 20 students who participated in learning how to carve a Welcome Post with Dylan Thomas and we are keen to see the finished result over the course of this new academic year.
- Our performing arts program thrived school-wide, with the Grade 5 production of Cinderella, the Grade 8 original film The 50 Year Curse, and the Senior School's SMUS Revue, a compilation of iconic Broadway moments.
- As we continue to prioritize sustainability, a group of Senior School students from Green Council piloted food growing in partnership with Sodexo, through an indoor vertical farming wall, called a ZipGrow Education Rack. The students successfully grew a variety of vegetables, including different types of lettuce, spinach, kale, and others. This vertical farming wall pilot project also was a great opportunity for other curricular connections including business, environmental science and visual art.
- We continue to infuse our program with technology and real-world application to support authentic learning experiences across the program. For example, in our Senior School biology program, to support our DNA fingerprinting processes, we have added six gel electrophoresis systems to the lab, enough for a full class of students working in pairs to each gain hands-on lab experience.
- As part of a Genius Hour activity, a group of Grade 3 students chose to purse filmmaking and created a documentary to celebrate our Jubilee year. The documentary was self-directed and completely student-led with the development of skills such as interviewing, scripting, filming, and editing. It was an excellent initiative to connect with alumni and teachers who were interviewed by the students to celebrate our Jubilee.
- At the Junior School, our students continue to benefit from a targeted approach on numeracy with success in math contests throughout the year. As a school, we made the National Honour Roll for the Thales (Grade 3) and Fibonacci (Grade 5) math contests. In the Thales contest, two of our students placed in the honour roll and in the Fiobonacci contest, one student placed in the honour roll at 116th of just over 5,000 students nationwide.
- Our Middle School students have earned strong recognition for their results in several STEAM and math competitions over the year, including participation in the Vancouver Island Regional Science Fair. Our math challengers placed 5th and 9th place provincially and we had one student finish in the top 10.
- Middle School student Liam Shah was a finalist in the Canadian Geographic Challenge.

- Our Grade 6 Humanities students entered a contest for Habitat for Humanity, called 'The Meaning of Home'. One of our students, Levi Budd, won \$10,000 for his essay on this topic among 13,000 entries. The \$10,000 prize will go to supporting the non-profit to build homes for the homeless in Victoria.
- In the Regional Robotics Challenge, two SMUS teams placed first and second.
- As part of our priority of providing student leadership opportunities, a group of five Grade 8 students organized a mental health afternoon for their grade called, 'You are not alone' on topics that are significant to this age and stage. The afternoon included a guest panel and Q&A with Grade 12 students who shared their own challenges and strategies with the students.
- One of our Grade 11 students had her personal essay, 'I learned to see my grandma, not her dementia' published in the Globe and Mail. Our focus in the English program has been to have students submit their work to external audiences for publishing.
- As we continue to encourage our SMUS students to publish and share their work externally when the opportunity presents itself, one of our teachers modelled this for her students. Middle School teacher, Katie Marti, submitted her poem, 'hydrodynamics' to the 2021 CBC Poetry Prize and was longlisted among the finalists.
- Two SMUS students competed in the finals of the national public speaking competition, 'Speech and Debate Canada'. Students from across the country were invited to submit speeches on the topic "Making Canada Better." Rowan Denis made the finals in the Junior category and Maya Achuthan in the Senior. Rowan spoke on the problem of social media and proposed silent reading as a way to improve mental health and brain power. Maya spoke on the problem of homelessness across Canada and highlighted some BC initiatives that were improving the situation. The performances of both students were highly praised by the celebrity judge and both students finished third overall in their categories.
- Eight SMUS students were selected to display their art in Victoria's Limelight Youth Art Exhibition for the month of June.
- Grade 4 students were invited to display their multimedia posters at Hillside Mall during World Oceans Week in June to celebrate their learning about the various threats to our oceans, including climate change, plastic pollution, overfishing, and noise pollution. The posters included QR codes where guests could listen to studentmade podcasts about the poster information as demonstration of learning.
- SMUS entered a team of five students to represent our school as the first ever team from British Columbia to participate in the Canadian Young Physicists'Tournament last spring. The judges commended the team on their experimental design, theoretical knowledge, and communication skills. Although the team did not medal to compete in the International Young Physicists'Tournament, many valuable skills were developed in the process.



Community Engagement

- Over the past year, we were able to enjoy hosting social activities such as: coffee mornings, grade- and school-specific social events, and an all-school parent reception hosted by the PA to celebrate the work of the PA as part of the school's Jubilee Celebration. While we continued to host nearly all of the PA meetings virtually, we welcomed the opportunity to host this meeting in a hybrid format and this experience will inform decisions regarding meeting formats for the coming years.
- In non-COVID years we host several family and parent events such as a Christmas family gala and Quiz Nights as ways to bring our parent/family community to gather socially. We look forward to hosting these events again in the future.
- We hosted our Staff Appreciation Lunch at both campuses and this event is greatly appreciated and enjoyed by all staff. For the PA, it is a great pleasure to be able to show our gratitude to the school staff, and parents show their depth of appreciation through the thoughtful crafting of many delicious food items and gifts for the staff.

Services

- We run an extremely popular used uniform program. Along with offering monthly used uniform sales from the Derby location, we also offer a back-to-school sale over the Labour Day weekend. Used uniform sales generate significant revenue for the PA, while fostering a spirit of environmental sustainability. Used uniform revenue is redirected to the students through our Allocations process. This process allows teachers to request funding for programs and products that enhance student life and enrichment opportunities within and outside the classroom.
- The PA runs weekly lunch programs at all three schools. This also generates substantial revenue that is redirected to enhance student life and learning through the Allocations process.
- To support our boarding students, we offer birthday treat delivery services. We hope to be able to return to organizing activities such as Boarders Without Borders dinner parties in our homes and inviting students for homestays during holidays and school breaks.

Philanthropy

- Our scholarship fund within the school endowment continues to support our PA named scholar who will graduate in 2023.
- We provide funding to all three schools for projects identified by staff and students to provide enhanced opportunities for students across a broad spectrum. A total of \$83,000 was allocated. Some highlights of last year's allocations were a significant "top-up" to enable the expedited purchase of crosswalk lights and signage at the Junior School to help address ongoing traffic concerns there. Kayaks, basketball uniforms and a new shot clock, numerous STEAM products and ZipGrow garden systems for two schools that align with the sustainability projects at the school were other highlights of the year.
- We contribute monies for each grade to host social events for the parents and families, in order to enhance social opportunities and foster deeper connections across the parent community.
- We contribute graduation funding grants to support Grades 5, 8 and 12 class celebrations to mark these important rites of passage.

Alumni Engagement

Highlight, Activities and Events of 2021-22

SMUS CONNECT

With the addition of our Grade 12 students and current parents, we have seen a surge of participation on our SMUS Connect platform. In the 2021-22 school year, we have seen our membership grow to more than 1,800 registered users. The scope of this SMUS-exclusive networking tool is broadening and becoming a valuable resource for our community members to find and reminisce with fellow classmates, give back through mentorship and business opportunities, connect with other parents, and share updates and events happening all around the world.

MENTORSHIP

Our Alumni Mentorship Program (AMP) is a commitment from the school to provide meaningful school community connections for life. With close to 6,000 connected alumni working in myriad careers around the world, AMP makes it possible for members to connect with one another to support professional development, and amplify their networks and success. Facilitated through SMUS Connect, we currently have 1,100 alumni who have indicated they are willing to help by participating as a potential mentor.

As part of the BC Grade 10-12 Career Education curriculum, there is a mandatory mentorship component. This year, we introduced SMUS Connect as the tool to access AMP and presented to our Grade 12 students on how to engage with our alumni community who are willing to act as mentors. As a result, we had a 95% student registration rate on the platform and saw Mentoring relationships grow.

DISTINGUISHED ALUMNI AWARD

We were delighted to announce Gargee Ghosh '93 as the 2021 Distinguished Alumni Award recipient.

In her role as President of Global Policy and Advocacy for the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, Gargee oversees government affairs, economic policy, advocacy, and philanthropic partnerships in support of the foundation's goals around the world. She is also responsible for the foundation's regional offices and strategic presence in Europe and the Asia-Pacific region.

The Distinguished Alumni Award was founded in 2010 by the St. Michaels University School Alumni Association to recognize the truly outstanding and inspiring achievements of our diverse alumni community. The goal is to recognize those who have excelled in their chosen field, while exemplifying the core Values of the school, which are respect, courage, honesty and service. The Distinguished Alumni Committee selected Gargee for her courage and service.

FINANCIAL AID FEBRUARY IMPACT SERIES

As part of Financial Aid February campaign, we engaged alumni from the past decade to be part of a series of testimonials about the impact financial aid had on their education and their lives. We had an overwhelming response and published several stories in this online series: The Lasting Impact of Financial Aid.

HERITAGE WALK ALUMNI BRICKS

This year, we had a record response to our Heritage Walk brick initiative in support of financial aid. Sixty alumni spanning seven decades purchased a commemorative brick that was added to the Walk as a special tribute to their connection with SMUS.

ALUMNI NEWSLETTER

Alumni, past parents, and past staff and faculty readership has grown from 31% to 46% over the past year with a strong indication of interest in our current school activities, programs and student experience. This communications tool is a trusted vehicle for Advancement, Admissions, and Alumni-specific messaging and will continue to evolve as we focus on feedback from our alumni community.

ALUMNI/JUBILEE EVENTS AND PROJECTS

The Jubilee year was fittingly launched to all of the students of today on the fields of the Richmond Road campus in September when the school year began, and it culminated in the May 2022 Alumni Weekend when many of our alumni returned for the first such event in three years. Throughout the year, we acknowledged and celebrated the amalgamation of St. Michael's School and University School into St. Michaels University School and found ways to highlight the growth and evolution over the past 50 years.

- Alumni Weekend It was three years in the making, and our entire community came out in droves to celebrate our school. We welcomed more than 700 alumni and guests back to campus for this three-day event where alumni, students, staff and faculty (past and present), parents and friends of SMUS gathered to show that our school ties are as strong as ever and continue growing stronger every year. All the different aspects of the weekend contributed to this being a successful, inclusive whole SMUS community event.
- Alumni & Student Rugby Banquet The evolution of this tradition leading into Alumni Weekend, particularly the inclusion of our Senior Girls Rugby players, coaches and alumnae, contributed to its overall success. As a result of ticket sales and additional donations, just over \$5,000 will go towards the current rugby program and coaching development at SMUS. This event also generated new gifts to the Annual Appeal contributing to the growth in Alumni participation. Student athletes and coaching staff were sponsored by the school to attend the banquet. We look forward to growing and evolving this event in future and, of course, are open to any and all sponsorship contributions that will help offset costs to the school.
- **Emeriti** In March, we welcomed back past faculty and staff to honour their contribution, connection and dedication to the school. We are grateful for the lasting relationships and support from those who were instrumental in building SMUS to be the exceptional institution it is today.
- St. Michael's School As part of our Jubilee celebrations, we hosted two events where we welcomed back St. Michael's School Old Boys, students who attended St. Michael's School before amalgamation and before girls were part of the school. At a reception in the fall, a joyful group spent a few hours together reconnecting, telling the stories of their youth and sharing fond memories of their time at the school. And in June we were able to host a weekend reunion, attracting alumni from around the world, some visiting the Junior School campus for the first time since they left St. Michael's. The weekend included the tradition of Ice Cream Day, a drill exercise, a tour of the current Junior School with an overview of the new Junior School Annex project, and concluded with a dinner at Graves Hall, giving the Old Boys a taste of the current student experience.
- Jubilee Ambassadors Through creative storytelling, mentorship opportunities with students and fellow alumni, speaking engagements and events, we introduced a distinguished group of Jubilee Ambassadors. Each Ambassador's SMUS journey began



with an ambition and interpretation of our Vision: To Learn, to Lead, to Serve. It is through sharing where this journey has now taken them, and inviting our Jubilee Ambassadors to express their pride and enthusiasm for the school, that we are able to paint a picture of where our school has come from, where we are now, and where we aim to be for the next 50 years.

Our Living Archives - As we reflected on the anniversary of our amalgamation, a living archive project emerged as a way to look back on our storied history, capturing unique memories and perspectives that can now live on for generations to come. We were thrilled and proud to release the full documentary, 'Our Living Archives - A Jubilee Year Project.' 

Building Our Future Together



The support of more than 600 donors in 2021-22 contributed more than \$2.2 million to a wide variety of needs at the school. These gifts came from donations to the Annual Appeal, to endowment funds and financial aid, and to capital projects.



Financial Aid at SMUS

Last year, \$1.9 million was awarded in both financial aid and merit scholarships to qualified students, not including the students of staff and faculty, who also greatly enrich our community. Nearly \$300,000 was raised towards this amount from a very successful Annual Appeal in 2021-22, and a further \$689, 881 came from our endowment funds. These amounts benefited students in all three schools.

Vivat Foundation

The key purpose of the Vivat Foundation is to provide financial management and distribution of the school's endowed funds, working in close collaboration and alignment with the Board of Governors of SMUS by way of a common mission and vision, and with the Advancement department of the school.

The Vivat Foundation board has regularly scheduled meetings during the school year to review the reports of the funds' professional managers and to review possible changes to the funds' asset mix to ensure strong rates of return.

Our Endowment

The endowment is made up of multiple individual funds that have been established over decades of generous philanthropic support by many members of the SMUS community. These donated funds are held within the Vivat Foundation and managed by our investment managers at Connor, Clark & Lunn, guided by a board-approved investment policy. To date, 75 named endowment funds have been created, supporting a variety of initiatives, primarily centring on financial aid (sometimes referred to as bursaries) and scholarships. Financial aid is needs-based and is a core strategic commitment by SMUS to ensure accessibility to our school for exceptional students who otherwise would not be able to attend and benefit from the breadth and quality of our programming. Scholarships are those funds established to make a financial award based on merit or other achievements.

How Do These Endowed Funds Support SMUS?

The total market value of the endowed funds under management within the Vivat Foundation as of June 30, 2022, was \$18,440,000. Thanks to the generosity of our community, \$276,000 in new endowed fund donations were contributed in 2021-22, adding to our ability to award financial aid and scholarships. Over the past five years, endowed funds have grown more than 52% by way of new donations and careful investment.

Treasurer's Report and Financials

On behalf of the Finance Committee and the Board of Governors, I am pleased to report that the school's auditors have once again issued an unqualified report to the financial statements for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2022. A summarized statement of operating revenue and expenses is included with this report.

The school's strategy is to achieve a balanced annual operating budget where revenues are equal to expenses, with an appropriate allocation to the reserve. In 2022 the transfer to reserve was approximately \$4.1 million (2021: \$3.1 million). The 2021-22 school year saw some ongoing operational challenges due to the COVID-19 pandemic, which impacted our revenue. Nevertheless, for the 2022 fiscal year, there was an overall small gross operating surplus of \$4,604 (2021: \$11,926) after inter-fund transfers.

The school continues to prioritize and is working hard to ensure affordability, especially as we go forward beyond the pandemic into an uncertain economic environment. In fiscal 2022, a total of \$2.1 million (2021: \$2.8 million) was made available to families through financial aid and staff bursaries. Financial aid is funded from several sources, including endowment funds, the Annual Appeal and school operations.

For 2023 we will continue to seek delivery of the highest quality programs to our students within a sustainable operating budget. A strong fiscal 2022 is a key component to meeting this goal. Some specific highlights from fiscal 2022 are:

- The school's financial position remained strong with combined net fund balances of more than \$46.8 million (2021: \$39.2 million) including \$33.8 million (2021: \$30.8 million) in capital funds at the end of the fiscal year.
- The school's long-term debt stands at \$4.9 million (2021: \$6.1 million) with annual debt-servicing costs representing 2.3 % (2021: 3.4 %) of gross operating revenue, which is well within the 10% allowed under the Society's bylaws.
