

Message from the Head of School

As I write, the skies are darkening, releasing much needed refreshing and revitalizing rain on the parched landscapes of British Columbia. The beginning of a new school year always crackles with positivity. This year particularly so.

We have recently received with gratitude, relief, and great excitement, the permit to occupy the Trottier-Morgan Annex at the Junior School. This long overdue facility will make the Junior School fit for the purpose of educating its full student enrolment. Our infrastructure has not kept up with years of incremental expansion, resulting in the addition of portables. I am delighted that the Board of Governors agreed that portables should never become a permanent solution. Even with the vision of improved facilities there was much to be done. I would like to express thanks to the Trottier-Morgan family for keeping the dream alive and providing the philanthropic leadership that has now resulted in a wonderful building that will facilitate that special alchemy that comes together when inspired teachers and curious learners are supported by a breadth of opportunity, and facilities that are fit for purpose. The cornerstone inscription on the new annex reads Ut Omnes Hic Floreant, which translates as 'may all flourish here'. I know that the Junior School staff and faculty, after a year of disruption, will do their best to support our youngest students as they deepen their roots.


We are also thrilled to see that the Wenman Pavilion is back in action after 18 months of renovation and makeover. This year, we will be able to host provincial and other sporting tournaments in a style that befits the reputation of our school.

I am also grateful to pass on thanks to our anonymous donor who has contributed \$2 million toward the refurbishment of our boarding facilities. As a school community, based in Victoria, I believe we are

immeasurably richer for the diversity and talent that is infused by our 250 boarding students, many hailing from more than 30 countries around the world. We remain committed to the aim of providing these students with some of the best boarding accommodations in Canada. Refurbished public spaces and, specifically, redesigned bedrooms and ensuite bathrooms, will allow us to achieve that aim into the future.

This year, in the build up to the return of students, our Senior Leadership Team spent two days off-campus on our annual retreat, where they planned for the future. Future Design School facilitated our discussions by enabling us to reflect on how the school should continue to evolve to deliver its vision and mission. Further, we were reminded of the following skills identified by the World Economic Forum as being crucial for the next generation.





On reflection, we felt that the all-round breadth of a SMUS education and our commitment to a holistic learning program, prepares our students well for the vast majority of these skills. Specifically, with respect to forward planning as it is part of our Floreat strategic plan, we identified the importance of a STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, Mathematics) educational approach. At the same retreat, we received the draft recommendations of the STEAM Working Group, which after extensive research, including the visiting of 35 schools renowned as leaders in the STEAM field globally, identified specific ways that our school must move forward. Naturally, this will involve investment in human resources – the right people to bring this vision to life, the programs to deliver their vision, and the facilities to enable the vision to become a reality.

We are also excited to move ahead with a raft of initiatives around the pillar of sustainability. While last year the school achieved the Platinum Eco School Award (the highest level), we were reminded there is much work still to do in an area that will influence the quality of life that generations of future students will be able to enjoy.

Many of you will recall that last year the Board of Governors received, debated, and approved the recommendations of the EDI Advisory Group. This year, we are delighted to welcome Dacia Douhaibi as EDI Coordinator, and sociology teacher, David Lynch, in his new role as Indigenous Liaison.

At the end of last year, in the *Floreat Year End Report (June 2023)*, I summarized our progress against the aims we had set for ourselves. I hope you will read the article following this introductory message.

Other key developments that should be recorded are:

- Our Senior Leadership Team has been reorganized with the promotion of Eliot Anderson to the role of Deputy Head of School. Eliot will also continue as Director of Senior School.
- Also, joining our Senior Leadership Team for the first time is Chanelle Bertelsen '11, as Director of Marketing and Communications.
- We are pleased to report that the work of Chetan Sondagar, who arrived last year as our first-ever Chief Information Officer, is moving forward with an extensive review and a tightening up of our cybersecurity.
- Once again, the school would like to record its gratitude to the SMUS Parents' Auxiliary which has, over the last few years, been ably led by Elisa Djurickovic. We are most grateful for the moral and practical support the Parents' Auxiliary provides.
- We have also been able to welcome Neil Mulholland as the new President of SMUSAA. It is worth noting that, over the last few years, the number of students from alumni families has been steadily rising. This year, the 2023-24 academic year opens with a record number of alumni children at SMUS. We are pleased that the school is building a reputation for its intergenerational connections.

Lastly, we are most grateful for all those who continue to promote their school and support us in a myriad of ways.

Message from the Chair of the Board of Governors

It is a privilege and an honour to report to you as the Chair of the Board of Governors for the SMUS Society for 2022-23.

Once again, it was a busy year for the Board. Primarily, we were focused on our strategic priorities looking ahead for the next 20 (or more) years, and the efforts to keep our school relevant in a very competitive environment.

It was a pleasure to work with a specific group of Senior Leadership Team members, alongside the Board of Governors, to develop a comprehensive set of recommendations relating to Equity, Diversity and Inclusion (EDI). This document, 'signed' by the Board in December of 2022, through a unanimous vote of approval, was developed jointly by the EDI committee and the Board throughout the later part of 2022. The school has hired specific staff in order to implement the recommendations of the EDI committee and Board. I am proud of the fact that we have taken specific steps to implement policies that promote Equity, Diversity and Inclusion.

Equally, I am proud that we have also begun detailed work, with specific recommendations, to implement a more ecologically sustainable approach to our operations and expansion. In March of 2023, we passed a motion to commit to a 60 per cent reduction, year-over-year, in our greenhouse gas emissions. In 2023, SMUS earned a Platinum award from EcoSchools Canada, a registered charity that aims to nurture environmental leadership, reduce the ecological impact of schools, and build environmentally responsible school communities. Additionally, we are currently on track to win a Platinum award in 2024.

I am so pleased that, by the time you read this, our new Junior School Annex will have been formally opened and will be fully operational. The Junior School was long overdue for a major refurbishment. Not only has this project brought the Junior School 'up to par' but has increased enrolment, expanding to include a new Junior Kindergarten program. The enthusiasm with which the local community signed up for that new class (prior to the building's completion) is a testament to our school's local reputation as well as to the foresight that went into the expansion.

We owe a great deal to the hard work of the members of the Senior Leadership Team (SLT) – particularly Andy Rodford and Rita Lord – for bringing this program to its conclusion, on time. The completion of this building had to be finished, and its Occupancy Permit awarded, in August of 2023 – all in an environment, post-COVID, still beset with supply-chain issues and outrageous inflation. The SLT's calm discipline served as an example for the next projects before us: the Middle School renovation and the subsequent addition of a new Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, and Mathematics (STEAM) Centre.

But, I cannot end this report without some melancholy. Andy Rodford has done so much for our school, and has interacted so closely (and often, so patiently) with the Board. That is why we are sad to see him depart SMUS. We at the Board wish Andy all the best. We will miss him.

I'm also very sad to report that one of our most beloved Advisory Governors, Tony Quainton, passed away this July. You'll read more about Tony's extraordinary life in *School Ties*, but I would tell you that his engagement with, and his advice to the Board was always extraordinary in its depth, insight, and diplomacy. Tony continually offered his wisdom to us ever so gracefully and with gravitas. He was an example to all of us on the Board, past and present, and he will be missed, immensely.

Finally, may I say thank you to the four Board members who are leaving us this year: Ann Glazier-Rothwell, Dan Sheehan, Gillian Hayden, and Peter Finamore. All four have run crucial committees (Advancement, Facilities, Governance, and Nominations) with style and efficiency. The school and the Board are better off now than we were before these four began in their roles. You'll all be missed. We welcome our four new acclaimed Governors: Fiona Donald, David Kim, Matt Howard, and Elisa Djurickovic, as well as our new Head of the Parents' Auxiliary, John MacKav.

We're so lucky to be here. Thank you for everything you do to support the school.

Admissions

On opening week, September 2022, St. Michaels University School welcomed 1,023 students, including 214 new learners. Very quickly, Admissions embarked on its recruitment initiatives as it looked to building enrolment for the 2023-24 school year. It was a year where the department began reconnecting with friends and contacts, near and far, and participated with in-person recruitment events locally, nationally, and internationally. It was exciting – and overdue – following multiple years of performing admissions behind a screen.

An overarching goal for Admissions is to continue to see an increase in admissions applications. The power of referrals served the school exceptionally well this year. Current families, alumni, students, staff, and friends of SMUS, play a significant role in admissions and we are grateful for their support and involvement. Benefitting from a more userfriendly and inclusive application, and between Junior School, Middle School, Senior School, and Boarding admissions efforts, this year, more applications to SMUS were processed than ever before. Most notably, this year marked the first time SMUS reached peak enrolment (including boarding) on May 31, well before the summer months. There is also the excitement in welcoming the school's newest and youngest students to SMUS who will form the inaugural Junior Kindergarten ages three- and four cohorts!

Admissions, once again, had to balance the unprecedented high demand for space while conforming to one of the key tenets of Floreat, the school's 10-year strategic plan. Through Floreat, SMUS Admissions was tasked with containing enrolment to ensure the quality of education and school experience that has allowed SMUS to retain its reputation as a leading international day- and boarding school. We also know decisions due to space meant disappointment for some families.

That SMUS is a leader in international education circles is not a boastful statement. In addition to our strong international footprint, this year we are celebrating our 10th anniversary working in partnership with the Takatuf Scholars Programme, sponsored by the Sultanate of Oman. SMUS is one of a handful of boarding schools in the world, and the only Canadian Accredited Independent School selected by the Programme. This highly selective and far-sighted initiative is designed to prepare Oman's youth for personal and academic success, with the goal of developing future leaders for that country. The SMUS community can be very proud of this partnership as we have seen our Omani students accepted to some of the world's leading post-secondary programs including Computer Science at Stanford University. More importantly, however, it reinforces what we are as a school: a thriving urbanbased community of diverse cultures with high expectations, varied opportunities, and a mission that recognizes the most important thing we can do for our students is support them to build strong character skills and a sense of identity that will serve them well into adulthood.

An important priority continues to be building and maintaining diversity at SMUS. The school's various tuition-assistance programs supported about 20 per cent of the school's student community which might otherwise not be able to attend SMUS. These programs brought together capable young people who also helped enrich the experience for the entire school community. The student tapestry that is SMUS is vibrant, diverse, and engaged in making this place a school that thrives for all.



Academic Achievements

The following list provides a summary of various highlights across our academic program in relation to strategic priorities and student success for 2022-23.

Academic Highlights

- Continued to focus on assessment data to inform instruction and target skills in literacy and numeracy from Kindergarten through to Grade 8. One key priority was to ensure students who require additional support or extension in their learning were at the forefront of our instructional practice.
- Experiential learning opportunities were abundant across our program, which included bringing in community experts, parents, and active demonstrations of learning. One excellent example of many includes our Grade 4 classes engaging in a transdiciplinary project on ocean sustainability which included using recycled materials, an embedded QR code with the student speaking about ocean stewardship and the projects were on display for World Ocean Week at Hillside Mall to educate the public.
- We continue to find opportunities for our students in the Arts, which also include the Grade 5 musical, the Middle School and Senior School musicals. We also had a unique opportunity in our Theatre Performance program to put on the play Hamlet at Craigdarroch Castle in Victoria, which was a unique venue for us and allowed for smaller audiences to move through the castle for various scenes in the play.
- Students in the Middle School had opportunities to showcase their science research projects at the annual Science Fair. To showcase their projects for the fair, the students incorporated their technology and design skills to allow for a transdisciplinary connection of skills. This science fair resulted in 15 of our Middle School students being invited to participate in the regional science fair, and from that, we had one student win a National Science Fair Award.
- We added more STEAM-oriented courses and extracurricular activities across our program, including Engineering and Design, additional robotics opportunities, New Media (English), and Graphic Art and Design.
- Our Junior School specialists successfully delivered robust programs to our students amidst the Annex construction project. Their creativity and commitment to student learning in visual arts, music, and physical education continued to be outstanding despite their temporary relocation and reflected quality programming for our young learners.
- Our commitment to professional development reflected more opportunities to bring in experts to work with our teachers on campus. These opportunities included literacy, writing strategies, Indigenous cultural understandings, poetry, writing workshops, and science and technology opportunities. Our professional learning ethos is to continue building the capacity of our teachers and a love of ongoing learning so that students ultimately benefit from this continued growth.
- The Portrait of a Learner remains a focus in student reflection in areas like chapel, assembly, learning tasks, and at the end of term.
- Grade 4 and 5 students participated in various math contests, and the scores of our top 5 students at each grade level placed SMUS in the top 100 across North America. One of our Grade 5 students was the provincial champion with a perfect score in his math contest.



- Every Middle School student had an opportunity to participate in two math contests: Canadian National Math League (CNML) and the Gauss. Three students were selected to attend math camps in the United States based on their scores on the CNML. In the Pascal math contest which is usually offered to Grade 9 students, SMUS saw 31 Grade 8 students volunteer to write this contest. One student scored in the top 5% among Canadian students.
- Our Math challengers in Grade 8 came second in the regional tournament with three students scoring in the top 10. The team went to provincials and two students scored in the top 10 in BC with one student being ranked second overall.
- We found the unique opportunity to partner with MIT and Stanford University graduate students in our Data Science 12 course to experience a 25 hour interdisciplinary project-based AI Capstone project. This was an online learning opportunity where the graduate student was on Zoom teaching our Data Science students throughout this project.
- SMUS participated in the Canadian Achievement Test (CAT 5) norming study at Grade 3, Grade 6 and Grade 9 on a variety of subtests including reading comprehension, writing, mathematics, computational thinking and estimation. Our school data will contribute to Canadian norms in preparation for the release of the new CAT 5 assessment in September 2026.

Athletics

2022-23 was an impressive year for SMUS Athletics, particularly on the girls side. SMUS Senior Girls teams won two BC championships – in field hockey and soccer – and earned provincial silver medals in basketball and rugby, with many athletes competing on more than one of those highly successful squads. In total, SMUS teams captured eight city titles and seven Island championships. 12 SMUS teams qualified for BC high school championship tournaments while squash and rowing athletes also made their mark with medal performances on the provincial and national scenes.

- Over the past year, we were able to enjoy hosting social activities such as: coffee mornings, grade- and school-specific social events, and large scale social events such as our Holiday Cocktail Party, Quiz Night and the family night extravaganza Rock 'n' Roll Rodeo. We returned to a combination of in-person monthly PA meetings and some virtual meetings. With each of these types we are pleased with parent engagement and parent feedback suggests that our monthly quest speakers are interesting and relevant to their interests.
- We hosted our Staff Appreciation Lunch at both campuses and this event is greatly appreciated and enjoyed by all staff. For the PA, it is a great pleasure to be able to show our gratitude to the school staff, and parents show their depth of appreciation through the thoughtful crafting of many delicious food items and gifts for the staff.

Services

- We run an extremely popular used uniform program. Along with offering monthly used uniform sales from the Derby location, we also offer a back-to-school sale over the Labour Day weekend. Used uniform sales generate significant revenue for the PA, while fostering a spirit of environmental sustainability. Used uniform revenue is redirected to the students through our Allocations process. This process allows teachers to request funding for programs and products that enhance student life and enrichment opportunities within and outside the classroom.
- The PA runs weekly lunch programs at all three schools. This also generates substantial revenue that is redirected to enhance student life and learning through the Allocations process.
- To support our boarding students, we offer birthday treat delivery services. We hope to be able to return to organizing activities such as Boarders Without Borders dinner parties in our homes and inviting students for homestays during holidays and school breaks.

Philanthropy

- Our scholarship fund within the school endowment continues to support our PA named scholar who graduated in 2023.
- We donated \$100,000 to the Junior School Annex project and will be the named donor on a new Grade 5 classroom to be enjoyed by students year over year
- We provide funding to all three schools for projects identified by staff and students to provide enhanced opportunities for students across a broad spectrum. A total of \$45,000 was allocated. Some highlights of last year's allocations were a Glowforge laser cutter, a large format printer, iPads for the Yearbook Club and Cubetto robots for our youngest Applied Design, Skills and Technologies learners.
- We contribute monies for each grade to host social events for the parents and families, in order to enhance social opportunities and foster deeper connections across the parent community.
- We contribute graduation funding grants to support Grades 5, 8 and 12 class celebrations to mark these important rites of passage.

Alumni Engagement

Highlights, Activities and Events of 2022-23

SMUS CONNECT

With the addition of our Grade 10-12 students and current parents, we have seen a surge of participation on our SMUS Connect platform. In the 2022-23 school year, we have seen our membership grow to nearly 2,000 registered users. The scope of this SMUS-exclusive networking tool is broadening and becoming a valuable resource for our community members to find and reminisce with fellow classmates, give back through mentorship and business opportunities, connect with other parents, and share updates and events happening all around the world.

MENTORSHIP

Our Alumni Mentorship Program (AMP) is a commitment from the school to provide meaningful school community connections for life. With close to 6,000 connected alumni working in myriad careers around the world, AMP makes it possible for members to connect with one another to support professional development, and amplify their networks and success. Facilitated through SMUS Connect, we currently have more than 1,100 alumni who have indicated they are willing to help by participating as a potential mentor.

As part of the BC Grade 10-12 Career Education curriculum, there is a mandatory mentorship component. Building on the successful roll out last year, we introduced SMUS Connect as the tool to access AMP and presented to our newest Grade 12 students on how to engage with our alumni community who are willing to act as mentors.

DISTINGUISHED ALUMNI AWARD

We were delighted to welcome back Gargee Ghosh '93 to recieve her 2021 Distinguished Alumni Award. Gargee spent time in classroom sessions and was our special guest speaker at a senior student assembly.

In her role as President of Global Policy and Advocacy for the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, Gargee oversees government affairs, economic policy, advocacy, and philanthropic partnerships in support of the foundation's goals around the world. She is also responsible for the foundation's regional offices and strategic presence in Europe and the Asia-Pacific region.

The Distinguished Alumni Award was founded in 2010 by the St. Michaels University School Alumni Association to recognize the truly outstanding and inspiring achievements of our diverse alumni community. The goal is to recognize those who have excelled in their chosen field, while exemplifying the core values of the school, which are respect, courage, honesty and service. The Distinguished Alumni Committee selected Gargee for her courage and service.

FINANCIAL AID FEBRUARY IMPACT SERIES

As part of Financial Aid February campaign, we engaged alumni from the past decade to be part of a series of testimonials about the impact financial aid had on their education and their lives. We had an overwhelming response and published several stories in this online series: The Lasting Impact of Financial Aid.

HERITAGE WALK ALUMNI BRICKS

We continue to build on our Heritage Walk brick initiative in support of financial aid. This year, we added bricks for alumni spanning several decades, as well as tribute bricks for some who have passed away, to commemorate their connection with SMUS.




ALUMNI NEWSLETTER

All the different aspects of the weekend contributed to this being a successful, inclusive whole SMUS community event.
- Alumni and Student Rugby Banquet The evolution of this tradition leading into Alumni Weekend, particularly the inclusion of our Senior Girls Rugby players, coaches and alumnae, contributed to its overall success. As a result of ticket sales and additional donations, just over \$5,500 will go toward the current rugby program and coaching development at SMUS. This event also generated new alumni gifts for the Annual Fund, contributing to the growth in Alumni participation percentage. We look forward to growing and evolving this event in the future and, of course, are open to any sponsorship contributions that will help offset costs to the school.

The Vivat Foundation board has regularly scheduled meetings during the school year to review the reports of the funds' professional managers and to review possible changes to the funds' asset mix to ensure strong rates of return.

Our Endowment

The endowment is made up of multiple individual funds that have been established over decades of generous philanthropic support by many members of the SMUS community. These donated funds are held within the Vivat Foundation and managed by our investment managers at Connor, Clark & Lunn, guided by a board-approved investment policy. To date, 75 named endowment funds have been created, supporting a variety of initiatives, centring on financial aid. It is needs-based and a core strategic commitment by SMUS to ensure accessibility to our school for exceptional students who otherwise would not be able to attend and benefit from the breadth and quality of our programming.

How Do These Endowed Funds Support SMUS?

The total market value of the endowed funds under management within the Vivat Foundation as of June 30, 2023, was \$17,469,172. Thanks to the generosity of our community, \$235,469 in new endowed fund donations were contributed in 2022-23, adding to our ability to award financial aid and scholarships. Over the past six years, endowed funds have grown by \$5,002,661 by way of new donations and sound investment.



Treasurer's Report and Financials

On behalf of the Finance Committee and the Board of Governors, I am pleased to report that the school's auditors have once again issued an unqualified report to the financial statements for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2023. A summarized statement of operating revenue and expenses is included with this report.

The school's strategy is to achieve a balanced annual operating budget where revenues are equal to expenses, with an appropriate allocation to the reserve. In 2023 the transfer to reserve was approximately \$4.1 million (2022: \$4.1 million). For the 2023 fiscal year, there was an overall small gross operating surplus of \$8,437 (2022: \$4,604) after inter-fund transfers.

The school continues to prioritize affordability for all families who choose SMUS, especially as we continue to navigate increasing inflationary pressures. In fiscal 2023, a total of \$2.3 million (2022: \$2.1 million) was made available to families through financial aid and staff bursaries. Financial aid is funded from several sources, including endowment funds, the Annual Fund and school operations.

A strong fiscal 2023 is a critical component to meeting the school's goal of providing the highest quality education within a sustainable operating budget going forward. Some specific highlights from fiscal 2023 are:

- The school's financial position remained strong with combined net fund balances of more than \$50.3 million (2022: \$46.8 million) including \$33.9 million (2022: \$33.8 million) in capital funds at the end of the fiscal year.
- The school's long-term bank debt stands at \$4.5 million (2022: \$4.9 million) with annual debt servicing costs representing 1.3% (2022: 2.3%) of gross operating revenue, which is well within the 10% allowed under the Society's bylaws.
